

CASE STUDY Sarah Williams

In Term 3 I assisted at the AFL Pink Power event, which promotes primary school girls to play AFL. We were allocated jobs to assist with 12 rounds across six fields, mostly helping with umpiring and scoring. My role helped make sure that the games were safe and the rules where being followed, whilst also making sure everyone was having fun. Without the help of SEDA, there would have been pressure on teachers to not only supervise their students but also umpire and score. I enjoyed being able to work with my classmates and help others to learn and enjoy AFL. It made me feel very useful and happy to help younger kids. I improved my patience and understanding as I was required to remain calm and explain rules to them. As the day went on I felt more confident when delivering instructions and demonstrating skills. A highlight for me was being able to be a part of young girls having the opportunity to experience AFL and develop their skills. This event reminded me why I enjoy SEDA as I get the opportunity to have these experiences and open up ideas for my career in the future.



CASE STUDY Lachlan Harvey

In Semester 1 I completed my work placement at AFL NT with the Game Development Officers. At schools I assisted the coaches with planning, setting up, delivery, and helping participants. I also assisted with administrative tasks for Auskick participants attending matchdays and got to be a part of the Cracker Cup, where I used my time management and organisational skills. Lastly, I helped umpiring at Gala Days. My role helped promote AFL/Auskick towards the younger audience. I made it easier for coaches to organise and supervise participants, especially at larger events. It felt good when I saw kids having fun and improving their skills because of my support. This experience allowed me to build more confidence in talking in front of a group, and I learnt some new games/activities that help improve fundamental skills, that I now use at my own club. My favourite moment was the Cracker Cup, because the participants got a lot of enjoyment on the day, and I felt like I positively contributed. The experience with AFL NT was important for me to help develop essential skills for work and coaching. This opportunity helped make it clear that I really enjoy coaching and teaching.
