

These events were held in order to gain as many junior cricket participants as possible as well as increase inclusion into our great game of cricket, which was personally a very rewarding experience for me. I have worked alongside and met the WA Autism Association staff during these events, including former Australian cricket captain Adam Gilchrist which was awesome! The roles I performed consisted of organising and managing the running of these sessions, putting my coaching skills to practice with the students and helping everyone get involved. I enjoyed being able to see so many kids having fun and participating in activities, I specifically liked being able to work with kids with autism as their experiences with WA Cricket help shape our game. I believe these events are important for WA Cricket as this helps influence the next generation of kids to get involved with cricket and helps parents with aligning them to local or endorsed clubs. I was able to gain knowledge on how to work with kids who have autism and give them an enjoyable experience that they may not usually have the opportunity to be a part of. These events have also fuelled my interest in working with children with all abilities, particularly in the cricket space.



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
